

Day 1 – Pastor Weekly

- 1) Read Exodus 4:13-31
- 2) Reflect upon v13-14 & v24-26. What does this say about God’s character? What kind of God is he?
- 3) “Anger” is one of those words that has a very personal definition or meaning. When you hear the word “anger,” what comes to mind for you?
- 4) Read Revelation 3:19 and remind yourself of what the love of God entails.
- 5) Last week we considered Read Revelation 2:1-7 & 3:1-19. Take some time to read it again and underline/highlight both the affirmations & anger of God.
- 6) Take some time to consider the Holy and all-knowing God who speaks to his churches in Revelation.
 - a. What do you think God would say to the angel that oversees your church and you?
 - b. How or where you have or are provoking his divine displeasure.
- 7) Worship this Holy God (don’t continue until you have worshipped well).

Day 2

- 1) Read Revelation 3:19 and Exodus 4:13-31
- 2) Open up last week’s Pastor Weekly and read the 3rd meditation at the end from J.A. Motyer
- 3) Reflect on the question, “What does it mean to be loved by God” and re-read Revelation 3:19 and Exodus 4:13-31. What do these passages tell us about what it means to be loved by God? -
- 4) Read James 1:19-27 asking yourself, “How does this passage flesh out what it means to be loved by God?”
- 5) Read again James 1:26-27. How does God feel about unrestrained speech? How does this contrast with our modern understanding of “authenticity”?
- 6) Take some time to enter the presence of the God that these passages have described. Offer up to him whatever it is you are feeling or thinking as you have reflected on these passages. Take some time to consider what it means to respond to him in light of these passages. Worship him.

Day 3

- 1) Read revelation 3:19 and Exodus 4:13-31. As these passages are becoming familiar to us, try to read them slowly asking God to help you not skim over or miss his Word. Ask him earnestly to speak to you.
- 2) Read Exodus 4:13-31 again and underline or highlight the things that, given God’s anger with Moses, are surprising or seemingly contradictory.
- 3) What are the ways that God continues to love, care for, and work through Moses?

- 4) This week we've considered God's holy and passionate displeasure and concern with us. How does it strike you to consider how God loves, cares for, and continues to work through Moses despite this?
- 5) Read Romans 7:24 – Romans 8:2. Can you identify with his and enter into the awe, wonder, and joy of it?
- 6) Take some time to reflect worshipfully on Romans 7:24-8:2

Day 4

- 1) Read Revelation 3:19 and Exodus 4:13-31 (As you read this now familiar passage, take time to enjoy how familiar, meaningful, and poignant it has become to you this week).
- 2) Read Titus 3:1-11
- 3) Go back through Titus 3 and highlight or underline what it says in remembrance of the grace of God to you? What does it say about
 - a. Who you once were?
 - b. What he did about it?
 - c. The character of God (v4)
- 4) Re-read Titus 3:1-7 and, whenever you come across a personal pronoun (them, we, us, etc) place your own name in it out loud. Read it again and place the name of your church in it.
- 5) Read again v10. What is it saying? What does it mean? What would this look like?
- 6) As God why he feels so strongly about this? (Don't rush past this question. Take some time with it before you move on)
- 7) Re-read Exodus 4:22. How does that help with Titus 3:10
- 8) Take some time to consider and reflect the God who is the father of a family that he loves.
 - a. Consider how he feels about his family?.
 - b. After considering that, take some time to worship God the Father of the church family.

Day 5

- 1) Open up and read this week's PastorWeekly email in your inbox.
- 2) Read the passage we will consider this coming Sunday in light of the questions in the email.
- 3) Review your devotional study from this week.
 - a. What have you experienced or learned about God and his character?
 - b. What have you experienced or learned about you and your church?
- 4) In Exodus 4 we've read about how Aaron and Zipporah played a crucial role in Moses life (and therefore ours). Who can you share what you have learned, experienced, and longed for with?

- 5) As an act of worship, take some time to write a brief email so someone (close friend, former mentor, your small group, your Wellspring Group, etc). Share with them what you have learned, experienced, and long for. (The goal of this is to not exhaustively explain everything, but to worship God by sharing his work and spurring others to obedience and worship).
